Panun Kashmir ("Our Own Kashmir") is a frontline organization of more than 350,000 Kashmiri Pandits. Dr. Agnishekhar has been instrumental in organizing the First and Second World Conferences of Kashmiri Pandits in 1993 and 1998. He recently led a Panun Kashmir delegation to the "Hague Appeal for Peace" civil society conference in The Hague, Netherlands.

Dr. Vijay SAZAWAL, Founding Member, Indo-American Kashmir Forum. The Indo-American Kashmir Forum—along with the Indo-Canadian Kashmir Forum and the Indo-European Kashmir Forum—are recognized NGOs which participate in the U.N. Human Rights Commission (UNHRC) Working Group on Minorities. Dr. Sazawal is the Overseas Coordinator of these organizations. He is also a member of the Kashmiri Pandit Political Steering Committee, based in Jammu & Kashmir. He recently testified before the U.S. Congress as an expert witness on the Kargil situation.

Ambassador Phillips TALBOT, President Emeritus of the Asia Society. Ambassador Talbot has had careers in journalism, academia, and public affairs. Prior to his appointment as the Asia Society's President in 1970, he served in the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations as Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern and South Asian Affairs. During his earlier career as a journalist, Ambassador Talbot covered the achievement of Indian and Pakistani independence as the South Asia correspondent for the Chicago Daily News.
